### Farewell Mrs. Wilkie Celebrating Decades of Commitment

fter 43 years as an educator and 25 years as a principal, Mrs. Judy Wilkie has decided to step away from her career in education to pursue personal passions and enjoy her retirement. Not long ago two Earl Buxton students had the opportunity to sit down with Mrs. Wilkie to discuss her career and her plans moving forward.

### Interviewer: Shaan Graham

### Q: How did you first get into education?

A: I first began working with children at the YMCA when I was about twelve. I enjoyed this work so much that I later began to study and work in education.

# Q: What unfinished goals did you wish to complete before your retirement?

A: I planned to revamp and improve the gifted and talented program at Edmonton Public School Board. Alas, I ran out of time.

### Q: What will you miss in your retirement?

A: Of course I will miss the people and school "family", but mostly the kid

### Q: What do you plan to do in your retirement?

A: At first, I plan to fully retire and rest for some time. Then, I plan to find opportunities for smaller projects and work. For example, I would love to get involved with a program that trains service dogs to assist children with developmental disabilities.

### Q: What advice might you give to an aspiring educator?

A: My advice would be to make sure that this is your "calling," that you have a passion, and truly want to pursue this career. Also, I would recommend being fluent in a second language, as it will make you stand out when you apply for a job. Begin volunteering at a young age to familiarize yourself with the field. Lastly, play an instrument!

### Q: What challenges have you encountered in your education career?

A: You may be surprised to hear that problems aren't always directly due to the kids. Sometimes the largest challenges come from "tractor parents" who can be tough to reason with.

### Q: What do you hope for in the future of education?

A: In the future, Mrs. Judy Wilkie hopes to see the Provincial Government of Alberta recognize the challenges and obstacles concerning the mental health status of students. In 2011, a survey among Ontario students in grades 7-12 was conducted, and data proves that 34% had some form of depression, anxiety, or serious social trials. Many Gifted and Talented students suffer from these disorders, and Mrs. Wilkie says that hopefully children diagnosed

with them will receive more constructive, immediate, and practical assistance. To accomplish this, the Special Education Services (G&T, IPP, ISP, Social Participation, Medical Conditions, Learning Disabilities, etc.) will need greater funding.

# Q: What is the greatest obstacle you have had to overcome in this position?

A: The greatest obstacle of being an education instructor is getting the support you know that a certain student(s) needs. Sometimes an educator will know exactly what a pupil may need, but the source cannot supply them fast enough or efficiently.

# Q: Are there any goals concerning your career as principal that you have yet to fulfill?

A: Mrs. Wilkie would still like to revamp the Fine Arts and the G&T programs, and update the curriculum to modern understanding. Currently, some tests in the Edmonton Public Schools District still use images and prompts from over 25 years ago. She says that she saw a test that is still in effect for first graders in which the picture prompt is a rotary dial telephone; many young students are unsure of what the machine is, as they are more familiar with modern devices such as iPhones, Samsungs, etc. The Fine Arts Program also has a very low number of qualified teachers who studied either musical theory, early childhood music learning, and/or choral conducting and received a bachelor's degree. So, it is very hard to find someone to fill elementary music positions.

### Q: What plans do you have for your retirement?

A: Mrs. Judy Wilkie plans to retire for much of her time, doing her hobbies and having no assigned schedule. However, she also wants to volunteer parttime in the community. She plans to help children recovering from trauma by reading to them, and bringing her dogs as comfort animals. Children suffering from PTSD and other like disorders have proven that emotional support animals, - such as dogs - calm them by helping to increase their level of the oxytocin chemical. Release of oxytocin assists with slowing heart rate, lowering high blood pressure, and prevents the deliverance of stress hormones.

# Q: What will you miss the most about being the principal of Earl Buxton Elementary School?

A: Mrs. Wilkie said that she will miss the students of Earl Buxton, the staff, and the hugs of children when she leaves the school. She has worked at EB for over ten years, and so when she retires it will be an emotional parting for the school.

Thank you Mrs. Wilkie! Your lifelong commitment to supporting students and families has left an indelible mark on the Riverbend Terwilegar community.

### **Brander Community Garden**

### We Welcome Your Waste

omposting is in the news! Upcoming changes to waste collection and separation may mean that you've already been thinking about the 'fate' of your organic waste. With the closure of Edmonton's Composting Facility maybe now is the time to 'give it a go' yourself.

Are you unable to compost your kitchen scraps? Not enough room for your own compost pile or bin? Grossed out by the thought of red wigglers in your kitchen? Ummmmm, what the heck is compost anyways!? Well, read on!

In its most simple terms, compost is decomposed (rotted) organic matter. Organic matter is anything that was once a living thing or produced by something living. Things like fruits, vegetables, paper products that have no plastics or foil components, leaves, sawdust, eggshells, etc. are all examples of organic matter. And they are all compostable! However, there are a few things that were once living but should not be composted. Dairy, meat, oils, pet waste, weeds and diseased plants are a few examples.

The process of taking organic matter and turning into compost is called composting. We at the Brander Community Garden are avid composters! Compost is a valuable resource for gardeners. It enriches the soil, allowing the soil to hold more nutrients and water. It's a natural alternative to chemical fertilizers. We also like that it takes what would otherwise be waste and transforms it into something useful. Plus, it's free if you make your own from stuff you were going to throw out anyways!

Not everyone is keen on the idea of a compost heap in their own backyard. It does attract some critters and has a bit of a learning curve. There's a "formula" that produces nice compost, involving a mix of browns, greens, water, and aeration. It also takes time - usually a minimum of 3 months to have enough decomposition to create a rich, brown compost that is ready to mix into the garden. Given our short gardening season in Edmonton, many composters will compost inside, year-round using red wiggler worms in a plastic bin.

If you're looking to reduce your household waste output, but don't want to compost on your own (red wigglers in your kitchen - no way!), why not drop off your kitchen scraps to add to our compost heap? You can visit us any Saturday morning during our peak growing season (May - early September). Our community garden is in the old batting cage beside the tennis courts at

14710 - 53 Avenue between Riverbend Junior High and St Monica School. We invite you to stay for a cup of coffee and learn a little bit more about how we create compost for use in our garden.



Karen Berry and her family have participated in Lemonade Stand Day year after year. This year's charitable goal means so much to them. When their daughter Hazel was born at 24 weeks gestation she weighed just 1 pound 11 ounces. She spent 107 days in the NICU at both the Stollery and the Royal Alexandra Hospital. Hazel was on a ventilator for the first two months of her life. She had countless blood transfusions and a PDA heart ligation surgery among others. She gave her parents countless scares over her time in the NICU.

"The Stollery and their staff were amazing. They took such great care of our daughter and gave her the best in medical care. They also took amazing care of us as her parents. They truly were the angels that gave us our beautiful little girl."

Having been at the Royal Alexandra Hospital NICU, the Barry family is so excited to be give back to both hospitals that helped save their daughter's life.

For Monita Chapman, that's what it's all about.

"I'm proud of the kids, my junior lemon squeezer committee, my entire team, the Stollery and this province for taking the time out to visit a stand or two and to give back to a hospital that has been there for so many Alberta families at their greatest time of need," says Chapman.

"The Stollery saved her life. It saved our lives. We are so blessed and thankful that we have such an incredible facility this close to us," says Karen Berry.

### **Does Your Home have Egress Windows?**

### Read About the Requirements



hether you're building a new house or renovating an old one, finishing a basement suite for aging parents or expanding it for children who have grown old enough to need more space, it is essential to remember the need for windows that can be used as an alternative exit in case of emergency, particularly if other routes are blocked. Government regulations such as the Alberta Building Code require that each bedroom and habitable basement have windows that provide an exit route from the house. The only two exceptions to this rule are if a bedroom has a door that leads directly outside or if a sprinkler system has been installed, otherwise egress windows are essential.

Because the purpose of the egress window is to provide a safe passage out of the house, it needs to meet several requirements: first, it must be large enough to allow an adult to fit through it; second, it must be located at an accessible height (no higher than 1.5 metres above the floor); and third, one must be able to open it easily from inside the house, without needing any tools. In the case of a habitable basement or a basement suite, these requirements may be complicated by the depth of the basement itself, and may necessitate the addition of a ladder to allow for safe egress. Of course adding a window large enough to perform its emergency exit function has the added benefit of allowing more daylight into what is typically a darker space.

Spring and summer are the perfect time for adding improvements to your home, but before you do, it is best to ensure that whatever changes you are planning meet the latest municipal and provincial regulations. Before you begin your renovations, please check out the latest regulations in the Alberta Building Code (Alberta Building Code 2014 Division B 9.9.10. Egress from Bedrooms), which can be found here: https://www.edmonton. ca/residential\_neighbourhoods/documents/PDF/sleeping\_room\_egress\_ window\_window\_well.pdf and confirm that your project meets all of the building codes and guidelines, while providing a beautiful and safe space for you and your family to enjoy in the years to come.

The videographer from a popular American competition TV show was scanning the competitors waiting their turn to perform, and caught a young girl saying, "They shouldn't give the old people the money or let them win. They're just going to die soon anyway." It is true that our society has focused priorities on youth and young adults. But it is also true that demographics will change that focus with the growing number of older adults.

Perhaps this young girl did not personally know any older people; it's hard to say where that statement came from. But it did make me stop and think whether my grandchildren knew the stories from my life. Often, my time is spent with them telling me about their lives, rather than them listening to stories from me, the 'elder.'

Summer is time for us to be outdoors, connect with family and friends, maybe do a few road trips. If you're like me, places or events can trigger a past memory, like being near a lake in the mountains reminded me of my young son learning to fish. One thought I have is that perhaps we should be keeping a journal with those memories. Keep them for ourselves, or for our family, or friends. It's a way to connect the generations, by sharing scenes, sights, sounds from our past or present. We would be creating a record, preserving our memories. This informal memoir would refresh the wonder we felt. I have heard that journaling can create long-term health benefits, but in ways different from exercising or watching our diet.

We are so fortunate to live in Edmonton, where seniors are respected and valued, where there exists a plethora of activities for us to enjoy. The Senior Centers across the city are fantastic resources for us to socialize, get fit, and learn new things. They are a place to belong to a community of peers. There are so many SWESA activities happening this summer: luncheons, informative talks, bus trips, Shakespeare in

the Park, fitness sessions, watercolour classes with Willie Wong. SWESA has a motto to be very welcoming to all who join us, so please consider this an invitation to do so.

### Updates from your Member of Parliament

s we approach the start of summer, I wanted to give you some updates on what we've been doing, both in our community and in Parliament.

I recently tabled my second Private Members' Motion in this Parliament. My motion proposes to change the existing open access publication policy to allow Canadians more access to publiclyfunded research. Currently, the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC), Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) and the National Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) must provide their

research to the public at no cost and free of most copyright restrictions. However, the federal government also supports research with funding for non-governmental organizations, which are not subject to the same rules. My motion proposes to expand the Tri-Agency Open Access Policy on publications to apply to all research funded by federal research grants. If

you're interested, I've put up some more detailed information for the motion on my website at www.mattjeneroux.ca/research-pmm.

This month, I'm once again hosting our annual event in Ottawa, Father's Day on the Hill: Conversations About Mental Health. Our continued aim is to help stamp out the stigma around men's mental health, with a focus on young men and fathers. ↑he park surrounding the Terwillegar Community Recreation Centre has been renamed to commemorate Bryan Anderson's 19 years as City Councillor for the Riverbend and Terwillegar neighborhoods. Family, friends and elected officials gathered on Sunday June 9th to honour Bryan at the sign unveiling for the new Bryan Anderson Athletic Grounds. The clouds and rain cleared just in time for more than 75 guests to enjoy perfect weather.

The Terwillegar Riverbend Advisory Council (TRAC) approached the City of Edmonton Naming Committee back in 2017 to see what might be possible to recognize Bryan. A formal application and presentation along with 38 letters of support followed, leading to the naming of the Bryan Anderson Athletic Grounds. This site is a special fit because it's in the heart of the area Bryan represented for 6 terms, it has existing sports fields and schools, and it surrounds the Terwillegar Community Recreation Centre which he advocated for.

Bryan was responsible for the Sport and Recreation Initiative on City Council, and he led the push to develop five new City Recreation Centres. Bryan also advocated for the development of the GO Centre, the Coronation Velodrome, numerous artificial turf facilities and other sports infrastructure during his time on City Council, all while staying actively engaged with our community. Southwest Edmonton also saw the addition of a new library, fire hall, EMS station and police station due to Bryan's work at City Hall. 



### The Ridge CL Community Building Project Status

The Ridge CL had intended to start construction of our building, parking lot and rink early 2018 but the quotes came in considerably higher than budgeted, and a grant we had applied for was considerably smaller than we had hoped. The building and parking lot and came in at about \$1.6M, and the multipurpose concrete base with rink boards came in at almost \$750K. Poor soil conditions are one major factor.

The Ridge board has set construction of the building as a priority over the rink due to the necessity of services such as water, and a place to store a snowblower and hoses. Snowbank rinks can be supported from a building in the short term. We currently have about \$1.3M in grants and saved funds so we are close but not close enough to the \$1.6M necessary to start.

The intent of the concrete pad for the rink is to provide a level, light coloured surface for a skating rink with permanent boards, and a multipurpose surface for the summer months. This could be a tennis court, four pickleball courts, several basketball courts, among other possibilities.



Next steps in our process include:

- Continue to review project design and scope for opportunities to reduce costs.
- Develop a fundraising strategy, including the potential for in-kind contributions and set up a separate society with charitable status
- Continue applying for grants
- Create a list of all Stakeholder groups interested in the development of the rink and building
- Find a person who can help with fundraising

### **Haddow Park Warming Hut**

In April two warming huts used by The City of Edmonton at Hawrelak and Victoria Parks for cross country skiing for the last 5 years became available and The Ridge CL requested one of them for us to place on our licensed land at Haddow Park, next the snowbank skating rink location and site of our future building. We have had a snowbank skating rink for most of the last 25 years but have never had a place to warm up in or sit in. When the skaters get cold their only option is to go home or sit in an idling vehicle.

The use of the warming shack will not be limited to the winter season. As with previous summers, Haddow Park will once again have a Green Shack Program this summer. The program is held outdoors, and is only cancelled in extreme weather. However, even a short period of poor weather can be a deterrent for children to remain around. The warming shack will also be a shelter for these children so they are not forced to go home during short periods of poor weather. We have had a Green Shack program in the fall for the last two years but are not currently scheduled for one for a minimum of the next 3 years because we had no shelter like a community league building for cold days.





The warming hut has Plexiglas on one end and very well insulated so it is warmed by the sun. It can get very warm inside during the summer, which deters its use during warm weather. The Plexiglas end will be oriented south during the winter for maximum heating.


The hut is about 12 ft x 8 ft, weighs under 2000 lbs and sits on two steel skids. Motion sensing, solar power lights will be installed to light up the hut if there is motion in the dark to deter unwarranted use during the night. We have already committed funds to spruce it up with new paint and possible murals on it.

We made our proposal to the City of Edmonton in late April to place the warming hut at Haddow Park but the application is still under review.

The final tweaks are being made to the label but we are pleased and impressed by the submission and their creativity. Congratulations and thank you Stephanie and Lynette! Thank you as well to Sue Trigg for coordinating it and to Vines for their support of TRAC and local communities.

### **Brander Garden ROCKS**




